The pediatric residency program at **Dartmouth Health Children's** is a comprehensive, fully accredited three-year training program with broad inpatient and outpatient experiences. At the core of our program is a strong focus on high-value, family-centered care. Faculty and residents enjoy the small-town and rural communities throughout New Hampshire and Vermont in which they practice and live, while at the same time receiving excellent academic training.

Our mission

Rigorous and personalized

Our program is characterized by high standards of academic and clinical achievement in a collegial learning environment. Faculty accessibility and program flexibility allows residents to individualize their professional development and to pursue focused academic interests and research initiatives.

Our talented faculty

Our talented faculty represent the full cohort of medical and surgical subspecialties in pediatrics and they are eager to share their expertise. A dedicated ambulatory faculty provides each resident with the same continuity clinic attending for three years. Additionally, residents work closely with our hospitalists, intensivists and specialists and develop strong longitudinal relationships. These relationships allow faculty to focus on and support each resident's education based on their specific strengths and areas for improvement. Our faculty are highly accessible to



our residents and with only one fellowship program (neonatology), our residents are able to work closely with our faculty in electives, consultations and chronic disease programs.

Each educational experience block is broken down into 3 weeks of a core or elective experience and 1 week of ambulatory/outpatient experience.
